hen people tell me they have doubts about their faith, I usually tell them that doubts can be a good thing. "Reflect on your doubts," I say. So very often the doubts bring someone to deeper faith and understanding. When people say they're not sure they believe in God anymore, often what they mean is that they don't believe in a particular idea of God, like the bearded old man in the sky or a God who "allows" children to die of cancer and "permits" wars that slaughter people.


What such doubts ask us to do is to rethink our understanding of who God is. Tossing out our old idea of God does not mean there is no God. It simply means we had a faulty or immature notion of God. It may take some time to rethink who God is, but if we stay with it, do some reading, ask some questions, and pray over it, we

may come to a deeper and richer understanding of God. In short, because I don't understand how something can be does not mean that that something—or someone—is not true or real.

In this week's Gospel, Thomas, who was not with the community when Jesus appeared, later could not believe that the Jesus he had known was alive. He doubted. Yet when he was with the community the following week, he discovered that the risen Lord was indeed real but in an entirely new reality. It takes a community of faith to become a believer.

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

My thanks to everyone who has offered support after I shared, in some homilies on a Lenten Sunday and during Holy Week, my brother-in-law's rapidly increasing dementia. My sister, his wife, describes it as losing him mentally, while he is still breathing. I have gone through that very illness in my role as a priest with several people over the years, supporting them, but as you can imagine, it is different when it is your family. My prayers for all of you who come to a holiday like Easter Sunday and remembered what it was like to share that feast day with a loved one whom you have lost. Since my brother's decline was so shockingly fast, happening during the weeks of Lent, it added to our family experience of the meaning of Lent, letting go of things in this world and remembering all this life 'returns to dust,' as we hear every Ash Wednesday. Then my sister and I went to see her husband at Easter and shared with him an Easter feast and some treats. He lit up when he saw a strawberry-flavored dessert that she knew he liked. (He was surprised that she knew!) Our family sharing delights around the table of his hospital bed, suggested the meaning of that Feast Day-- the mortality of our life in this world, raised up to sweet joys. The great biblical stories that we get to enjoy at every Sunday Mass of Easter time, of the encounters of those early disciples with Christ after the grave, and our encounters with Him now, are even sweeter. The sweetest encounters of all will be when we taste the delights of the heavenly banquet table with Him and with all those cherished loved ones who will have departed from this world before us. What a sweet joy that we already get to encounter Him as Church, at the Sunday banquet table today!

Recently we sent out a letter announcing a new activity of the St Ann's Sodality - The Vocation Prayer Bag. Thanks to the efforts and coordination of these ladies, Fr. Steve, Sandy Walls, and Hanna Butheris, principal, this has gotten off with a bang!!

The school children have enthusiastically gotten involved and a new family takes the bag home on each Friday. This week marks our 7th week of participation and our 7th school family who have enjoyed the joy of praying together specifically for vocations!!

However, school will be finished soon - believe it or not in about 6 weeks!!!!!!! And since we want to continue this activity thru the summer, we are going to let the rest of the parish in on the fun!

Beginning the weekend of May 20-21, we will be giving the bag to anyone - individual, couple, or family - who would like to participate!! This will allow any and/or all in the parish to participate in this evangelizing effort to pray together for vocations.

The bag includes a crucifix, candle, prayer cards, rosary, and instructions for their use. The Ladies of the St Ann's Sodality

Dear Padre,

I am very curious why, after his resurrection, Jesus told Mary Magdalene not to touch him, but in the upper room, Thomas was encouraged to touch him.

Saint John tells us of this incident between Mary and the risen Jesus. There are scholars who say that immediately after Jesus spoke to Mary he ascended to heaven. His encounter with Thomas, then, would be after the ascension, and the feast of the Ascension we celebrate forty days after Easter is simply a termination of Jesus' earthly appearances.

There is another explanation to consider, offered by other Scripture scholars. The word Jesus uses to tell Mary Magdalene not to touch him is more like "cling" to him. She cannot cling to her old relationship with Jesus. Since his resurrection, a new relationship is necessary. Mary was looking for the Jesus

she knew before the passion, not the Jesus of the resurrection. She must now come to know the risen Jesus.

Mary could not cling to Jesus because she had to see him in a new way. For Thomas, the situation is different. Jesus invites Thomas to place his hand on the wounds to prove that he is "real"—that he is really a new kind of being, a resurrected being. Thomas, in his way, also wants to cling to what he thought he knew about Jesus. Both he and Mary Magdalene were close to Jesus, but even so, there were things they still did not understand. Jesus always has the ability to surprise us.
