Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

I write this having just come from the Francis Borgia High School Baccalaureate Mass. If I wanted proof of why we need the spiritual side of All Things New, I just got it. This was a liturgical celebration of the completion of four years of our young people in our only local Catholic High School and for some of them, completion of 10 years at St Ignatius School right before that. The Mass sounded like a resuscitation attempt of a collective corpse, with the brave cantor trying to breathe life into the dead students, faculty, and families. I was singing out extra joyfully as I processed in with the other priests because our Parish had three graduates among the seniors. I got funny looks because I was showing joy-- not dirty looks--just polite tolerant surprised looks that anybody was into this moment. I know you will say, teenagers don't sing. First, that's complete nonsense. By tolerating that as some kind of norm, we help it to happen. There is a reason that most of our young people do not sing out to the Lord. That's about a feeling that is lacking that starts in our families and continues in our schools that create a culture where sports and activities come ahead of faith formation. So, if the argument is that the teens don't sing, then I should be able to look forward to some energy when the graduates do the readings, right? No, the proclamation of the Word of God was just as dead as the music. And that was done by select students chosen by the campus ministry. I'm not an idealist to believe there is some quick fix for this wide scale low energy in the Church. We will have to put in the time and the work, and it is going to take years of persistently asking the question - why we have parishes and Catholic schools and what are genuine ways to be a Catholic Family? Thank God there are a few of our families who are dealing with those questions in a genuine way. But there are not enough to reverse our current trend of yet another young generation of spiritually asleep members. After the physical restructuring of the Diocese, I will be joining the effort as the archbishop leads us in the spiritual re-evangelization of the Church. Pray for the fruits of the Holy Spirit as we anticipate his announcement next weekend and the spiritual follow-up. Blessings.

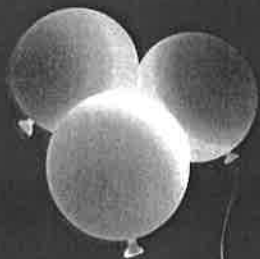

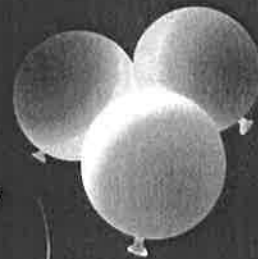

Dear Padre,

Why should I be confirmed?

In baptism, God calls you to be a priest, prophet and king. In confirmation, you receive the gifts of the Holy Spirit to live out those vocations. A priest offers prayer and sacrifice. In confirmation, you are moved to make your everyday life a sacrifice that you join to the sacrifice of Christ on the cross (Romans 12:1). *Prophet* is from *prophētēs*, a Greek word meaning “spokesperson.” In confirmation, you are compelled to preach the gospel (1 Corinthians 9:16), just as the apostles were when they received the Holy Spirit on the original day of Pentecost (Acts 2:2–4). When you were baptized, you were made a member of the royal family of God (1 Peter 2:9). Just as Jesus showed what it means to be a Servant King, so are we called to serve others in love. In confirmation, we are inspired by the love that God pours into us in his Holy Spirit (Romans 5:5).

In his first public preaching, Jesus quoted from Isaiah the prophet: “The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me” (Luke 4:18). That was the beginning of his public ministry. When the bishop anoints you with chrism, you can say the same. Your confirmation is the beginning of your own public ministry. ●



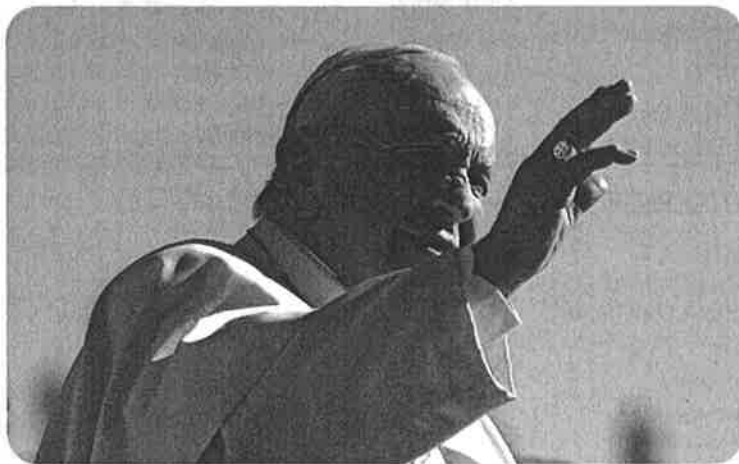
