

multiple-choice question: Life is (a) purgatory, (b) a party, (c) drudgery, (d) a maze, (e) a trial. Many of us might be inclined to answer, "All of the above." Life takes us along many paths, through many fields, and down many blind alleys.

The Camino de Santiago is a hiking trail of about 500 miles that begins in France, makes its way through Spain, and ends at the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, where tradition has it that the remains of St. James are buried. Many walk the journey to discover who they are and what their lives are about. Walking ten to fifteen miles a day with little to think about other than one's life tends to turn the hike into a pilgrimage that thousands have made over the centuries for just that purpose. The pilgrimage is arduous, often plagued with rain, blisters, shin splints, and a discovery of how to

travel light. But then, such is all of life.

This week's Emmaus Gospel recounts a similar journey compressed into one day. Like life, it begins in confusion, is scattered with insights and revelations about what has just taken place and ends with the discovery that the Lord has been the one walking with them. Faith does not solve one's problems nor eliminate one's difficulties. It does help us understand life and find meaning in the midst of it all, and somehow it brings us to realize that we do not travel alone, making the journey worthwhile and blessed.

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

If you are wondering why you are not hearing anything these days about All Things New, it is because the Archbishop and his advisors are going over literally thousands of pages of information about all the parishes, sent to him by tens of thousands of Catholics here. They are using that info and the pastor's votum, the final wish for the parish expressed by every pastor, to help the archbishop with his final decisions about the future of all parishes, which he will announce on Pentecost weekend, May 28th. Most of us priests are also standing by to be contacted about our next assignment. I should clarify something to be helpful with rumors out there. Recently a priest announced to all his people at weekend Masses that he knew that he was moving from his parish. Yes, some priests have been contacted about moving by the group called the Personnel Board. But even if that priest was contacted, that first contact from the Board was tentative. All of us priests have been clearly told that by the Priests Personnel director and by Father Martin, the director of the All Things New campaign. So that priest really does not know that he is moving yet. The tentative first contacts that all of us priests will get is part of the process the Diocese is using to help the archbishop come to his final decision about the assignments of all priests. When I get the phone call telling me whether I am staying here to lead the three parishes along the river or serve at a different pastorate, I will have to really pray to remember that first phone call is tentative and so the assignment that I am told about could change by the time the process for all priests is finished. Please keep praying for all of us priests who are on the edges of our seats right now, and for all of yourselves, wondering about your parish, but especially for Archbishop Rozanski.

Dear Volunteer,

As you may be aware, in compliance to directions from the National Catholic Bishops' Council. The Archdiocese of St. Louis has begun a Safe Environment Program (SEP). In November 2002, the national sexual abuse protection program "Protecting God's Children" now called "Prevent and Protect" was adopted as part of this program. It is provided at no cost to parishes, schools, and archdiocesan agencies. All archdiocesan employees and volunteers (this includes every parish/school in the archdiocese), who work with children on a regular basis are mandated to attend a presentation of this program. All clergy in the diocese (priests, deacons, seminarians, diaconate candidates, sisters, and brothers) also participate in this program.

Developed by National Catholic Services, "Prevent and Protect" is a comprehensive program which includes two video presentations which incorporate stories from victims of sexual abuse and their families who speak about the impact that the abuse has had on them. In addition, the videos feature testimony from perpetrators of child abuse who tell how they selected their victim's and how they made the victims feel that the abuse was their own fault. The program also provides information on how to prevent situations that can lead to abuse, what behaviors should raise concern about abuse, and how to report abuse. The program additionally provides an online continuing education for all parish and archdiocesan personnel who work with and have responsibility for the welfare of our children.

The above requirement applies to all employees and volunteers who have any contact with children – direct or indirect and can now be completed online (see attached). This includes parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and any others who plan to participate in activities with or around our children. Activities include – but are not limited to – helping at school (in any capacity) during or after school hours, any sports team, working around the school, room mothers/fathers, chaperoning, accompanying, or transporting children for field trips or any other activity – basically, any activity that puts you in contact with our children (grade or high school) in any way!! You are also required to read and sign a "Fair Credit Reporting Act Background Check Disclosure", this can be completed online. This requirement must be completed, kept updated, and on file for all employees and volunteers to insure the safety of our children.

This is extremely important!! We must comply with this mandate! Parishes are audited at random each year to determine their compliance. More importantly, this is one way to help insure the safety of our children.


ARCHDIOCESE OF ST. LOUIS CODE OF ETHICAL CONDUCT FOR MINORS VOLUNTEERING OR WORKING WITH YOUNGER CHILDREN

You are about to begin what could be a lifelong commitment to working or volunteering for the Catholic Church. It is a privilege to help carry on the mission of Jesus Christ, one that no one takes lightly. Moreover, as a minor yourself, it is important you follow certain rules and guidelines, both for your protection and for the protection of those to whom you minister. The church takes the issue of misconduct very seriously. Certainly any instance of your misconduct will be evaluated carefully, and you are urged to report any instances of misconduct that you see to the adult in charge of your area of service.

GENERAL CONDUCT FOR VOLOUNTEERS OR WORKERS WHO ARE MINORS

- 1. You must always be aware of your own protection and the protection of those with whom you are working.
- 2. You must never be alone with a younger child in your care.
- 3. You must never transport a younger child in your care.
- 4. When you are on an outing with younger children in your care there must be two adults present at all times.
- 5. You are not to access locker rooms, shower rooms and dressing rooms where younger children in you care are present unless an adult is present.
- 6. You are not to accompany a younger child in your care into a restroom without an adult present unless the circumstances make it absolutely unavoidable.
- 7. You must never have physical contact with younger children in your care, except as appropriate in connection with your duties.
- 8. You must never use inappropriate language when working with younger children.
- 9. You must never be involved with illegal possession and/or illegal use of drugs and/or alcohol in the presence of younger children in your care.
- 10. You must never use physical force or demeaning language in disciplining younger children in your care.
- 11. You have a responsible position with your Parish and you should live up to the expectations of trust that have been placed in you.
- 12. You must never take advantage of a younger child in you care.
- 13. You must be aware that Archdiocesan guidelines on child abuse are to be followed without exception whenever someone works or volunteers with a younger child to protect the rights of all involved.

The Archdiocese of St. Louis is grateful for the service you provide. Whenever you have questions or whenever you are uncertain about what is required, ask the adults with whom you work.

- 3. YOU MUST ALSO SIGN THE FORMS EITHER ONLINE (OR PAPER COPIES CAN BE GIVEN). COST IS A ONE TIME FEE OF \$8.00 AND IS AUTOMATICALLY UPDATED EVERY THREE MONTH'S THROUGH SELECTION.COM.

Dear Padre,

Our planet's condition is now a serious problem. Why is climate change hardly mentioned in homilies?

Many people view climate change as a political issue more than a religious one. As such, some homilists avoid controversial, politicized topics altogether; others are selective in preaching about them; still others tend to use the pulpit as a soapbox for a single political issue or a variety of them. Moreover, preachers themselves are not apolitical, nor are they all centrist in their ideologies. Like those in the pews, homilists have biases, too.

So how did climate change become so politicized? Despite



decades of substantial evidence from many respected scientific experts, confusion exists about climate change because the issue's scope is massive and hard to digest, international cooperation is mandatory, and polaropposite opinions of politicians and their followers are often intransigent. Nevertheless, Pope Francis convened an international conference in 2019 to look at how religions can help the world reach sustainable ecological goals by 2030 to, he said, repair "the damage we have done. No branch of science or form of wisdom should be overlooked, and this includes religions and the languages particular to them."

Thus, according to the Pope, "religious voices" play a crucial role in addressing the serious condition of our planet. Inasmuch as religion has a fundamental responsibility to offer people faith and hope in a better world—and homilies help believers find meaning and purpose—taking action and speaking out about humanity's well-being are becoming less optional.
