# God Opens Our Graves

t is not ghosts that come out of these graves, but a second chance at life. Ezekiel compares the reestablishment of ancient Israel after the exile with the dead rising alive from their graves. They are filled with God's spirit, God's power of life, and they have a second chance at living. Only the graciousness of God could imagine such a marvel; only the power of God could accomplish it. Jesus performs an even greater marvel. He actually brings Lazarus back from death, giving him a second chance at living. Once again, only the graciousness of God could imagine such a marvel; only the power of God could accomplish it. Jesus is that graciousness and that power, as he declares: "I am the resurrection and the life" (John 11:25).

After its reestablishment, Israel was not immune to failure, nor was Lazarus exempt from eventual death. That was not the point. The point was a demonstration of divine generosity at that particular moment. As seen in the Gospel reading, the point is Jesus' self-identification: "I am the resurrection and the life." What follows is


paradox: Those who live in him will not die; even if they die, they will live.

Joined to the one who is the resurrection and the life, we too will be raised from our graves and be transformed into a new life. We will never again face failure, as did the Israelites, or death, as did Lazarus, for the Spirit of Jesus will live in us.



Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

How are all of you doing as this physical separation from Church continues? I say physical because we must not let these circumstances dictate to us what it means to be Church in our souls. We have the exciting possibility, even in the midst of a stressful time, to create a way of being Church since we do not have our usual routines of weekly Sunday Mass, and school, and other gatherings. Please make note of the following as we try to create this new Church moment together...

First, we have to keep facing some facts. As the Archbishop continues to consult with public health officials, he updates his instruction to all Churches and schools regularly. His most recent instruction is that all parish Masses and services in Church are canceled for all of Holy Week and Easter Sunday. When we hear that the Church can reopen, we will get word out by all possible means I The suspension of all Catholic grade schools and high schools is extended through April 27th.

Because we cannot gather at worship in the usual manner, we are trying to be creative about ways to use our Church safely. For those of you who believe it is medically safe for you to leave your home for something essential, you may come in small groups, such as your families, as long as you stay 6 feet apart from other families in Church, and find some peace in your soul during regular times for weekend Mass, and enjoy Eucharistic Adoration. On Sundays we have it between the regular Mass times too. Please note in this Bulletin the full schedule for Confessions, and please make use of this important Sacrament of healing your soul at this Lenten time when we are healing our nation physically. The two healings go together. Note also the bulletin information about Adoration in Church at the usual times for Holy Week services.

Now some parish "housekeeping"...

- 1. Please tell us if you can access our bulletin on our website or Facebook page. This will save us some postage every week. Thanks to many of you who have already let us know.
- 2. From now on, we will not be doing a parish wide emailing before each weekend, or texting or phone calling to update you. The bulletin will be our regular communication every week, unless there is need of a more immediate communication, such as, God willing, the exciting message that we can reopen the Church! Please God make that happen soon.
- 3. Since we do not have a weekly collection of your Sunday envelope at Mass, in order to keep paying our teachers and staff and other bills, we need you to tell us how you can best turn that in to the office. Many of you have already done so, but some have not. You may drop it in the silver mailbox on the rectory porch, or bring it in to Cindy on weekdays, or feel free to mail it to the parish, 19127 Mill Road, Marthasville Missouri 63357. Some have even placed it in our big mailbox on Mill Road in front of the property. Thank you, thank youl We will reach out to you if we don't hear from you, to find out how you want to continue supporting the parish in financial Stewardship, or to let us know if you are facing a financial hardship now and cannot do so.

Many blessings as we come to the end of Lent, and in a whole new way, stand in need of God's healing Grace.

# Dear Padre,

I'm very disturbed at some clothing or lack thereof—worn at Mass these days. I find myself being judgmental and I don't want to be. Does our *Catechism* mandate a dress code?

Being judgmental can exist on both sides of this issue: Those who dress casually or inappropriately at Mass may be seen as unmotivated and disrespectful; those who dress up may be accused of doing so not for God but to impress everyone else at Mass.

The casual-dress advocates are influenced by the current relaxed cultural norms on attire—in church and elsewhere. They rightfully point out that one's presence at Mass is more important to God than one's clothing.



The dress-up advocates may believe this, too. However, the thought of actually being in God's presence at Mass determines their clothing choice.

Thus, an understanding of how the Mass is viewed today affects both casual-dress and dress-up proponents. While Catholics believe that Christ is present in all of creation and history, Christ's presence under the appearances of bread and wine is fundamental to our tradition. Moreover, a full appreciation of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist impacts far more than our outward appearances!

While the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* has no official dress guidelines, it's best to assume that most attend Mass for the same reasons as you. Essentially, most people who dress sensibly and make an effort to attend Mass are expressing their reverence and love for God.
