

Try It! You'll Like It!

f only temptation was obvious, we might have a better chance of avoiding it. But sometimes it's so subtle. It often disguises itself as something rather attractive. This is precisely what happened in the Garden of Eden. Scripture says temptation takes on a living form—a serpent that convinces the woman that the fruit of the wisdom tree will make them "like gods, who know good and evil" (Genesis 3:5).

Who wouldn't jump at such a possibility? Actually, who hasn't already fallen into that trap—acting as if we are God, thinking we know everything or wishing to be in complete control? Our faith certainly encourages us to become more and more like God. What made that desire wrong was the way Adam and Eve sought to become like gods in their own way, not God's way.

The Gospel passage tells us that Jesus also was tempted. Who doubts that Jesus wanted to be successful in his ministry? But what would he do to ensure success? Would he use divine power to attract a following? No! Would he call upon God to protect him from misunderstanding, rejection, even physical harm? No! Would he bargain with the devil, who obviously exercised power over many people? No! That was not the way he would be the Messiah. Unlike the couple in the Garden, Jesus recognized what was wrong even when it was disguised as something good. How good are we at recognizing temptation in our lives?



Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

If you were here Ash Wednesday, you heard me mention our Lent beginning with a bit of a strong "wind of the Holy Spirit!" We had a unique Mardi Gras moment, when Deacon Paul and I were burning and blessing many of our old palms, presented by our teachers and students in this customary ceremony in front of school. We are careful to burn only one palm at a time so that we don't have too big of a flame in the pot. Paul and I thought the Spirit must have been having a little (Mardi Gras) fun with us when a sudden gust of wind swept a tiny strand of burning Palms out of the pot. As the wind swirled, the strand created a circle of fire on the pavement for a split-second. "Cool! "Palm-nado!" said some of our clever students! What if we thought of Lent like that, before our promises of what we're 'going to give up or promises of extra prayers' and so on, if instead, we imagine Lent beginning with a Holy Spirit wind of God's Mercy sweeping us up and turning us around and around. That phrase is the literal meaning of conversion or, for those who are already Christians, ongoing conversion. The word means turning around, or around and around again, whatever it takes to get real about our sins. Saint Ignatius loved to use imagination to help us see what God does. He would have loved that image of the palm branches, that are changed to ashes representing our sins, as swirling fire! Can we picture our sins taken up by God in that way, rather than the hopeless way of seeing sin as baggage that we carry in endless drudgery? Isn't it possible to be honest about our continuing struggle with sins, even as we believe that God is taking hold of them in a powerful Spirit wind of love? Notice how imagination can bring joyful thought into our Lenten disciplines.

Dear Padre,

Is gambling a sin?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church mentions gambling in the context of "temperance" to moderate attachment to worldly goods, "justice" to render to our neighbor what is due, and "solidarity in accordance with the golden rule" (CCC 2407). "Games of chance (card games, etc.) or wagers are not in themselves contrary to justice. They become morally unacceptable when they deprive someone of what is necessary to provide for his needs and those of others. The passion for gambling risks becoming an enslavement. Unfair wagers and cheating at games constitute grave matter...." (CCC 2413).

Gambling, therefore, is morally neutral. When properly controlled, it can be a form of recreation for some. However, it becomes an enslavement when



obsessive gamblers neglect their families or jobs, risk financial security, and compromise their responsibilities to self, others, and God. The allure of winning and the desire to win even more—along with venues that provide easy gambling credit and other incentives—often make it harder for people to know their limits. Consequently, a severe gambling addiction can lead and has led to stealing to pay debts, divorce, job loss, despair, and suicide.

No wonder St. Augustine cautioned,

"The devil invented gambling." Even if Satan didn't invent it, he'll gladly take credit for it when gambling becomes a means to his ends. In so many words, those who win large amounts from lotteries and games of chance frequently warn, "All that glitters isn't gold." Despite its enticements, gambling ultimately fails to satisfy the human heart's longing for meaning and fulfillment.
