Pastor's letter to the People of St. Ignatius

On the last couple of Sundays, you heard me fervently calling everyone into more Eucharistic Adoration. I wonder what you thought about that. I trust you know it was about more than just promptings from the priest for more pious praying! Yes, I just piled up the p's, making light, perhaps in the same way that Jesus would have, with some of the priestly class and others in His time, who pushed people toward more piety as a way of making themselves feel important. Do not respond to your priest's invitation to more Adoration time because you were persuaded by me. In the same way, please do not decide to stay away, simply because you thought I was not persuasive. Whatever you decide, make it a response to Him. Here was His message last Sunday. I put two Scriptures together in my homily. In Jeremiah, we heard God say to that prophet, probably the most important words that He says to any of us, ever: "I am with you!"

Then in the Gospel of Mark, we heard a phrase from Jesus repeated two weeks in a row, "This Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

How does Adoration call you to hear these passages together? Like this. Since Adoration exposes the Risen Body of Jesus right out in front of you, it is the ultimate 'fulfillment' of "I am with you." Therefore that powerful phrase of Scripture was being 'fulfilled in your hearing' this priest calling you to be in His Presence. So who invited you to Adoration last Sunday? Some priest, or The High Priest. Now make your decision whether you're going to come, and for how long!

What is transubstantiation?

At the beginning of the Christian community, preachers and poets created magnificent descriptions of the Eucharist using images from the Jewish Scriptures as well as from the surrounding folklores. As Christianity spread throughout the centuries, especially in the developing

European monasteries and universities, theologians became more concerned both with defining the Eucharist more precisely and describing more exactly the changes that occur when the words of the priest are spoken over the bread and wine.

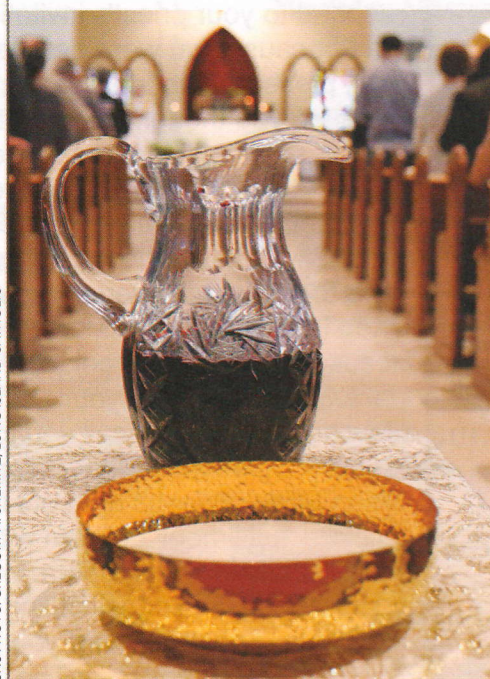
In the mid-sixteenth century, the Council of Trent, under the pressure of various misunderstandings and disagreements, articulated the doctrine we now know as transubstantiation. This doctrine, founded in the philosophy of Aristotle and clarified by St. Thomas Aquinas, seeks to explain without ambiguity that the Eucharist is a substantial change of bread and wine. The very substance—the “breadness”

and the “wineness” of the gifts—is transformed. Even though it looks and tastes like bread and wine, it no longer is; only the physical attributes remain. Bread and wine are now something new: the living Body and Blood of Christ.

The explanation offered by the doctrine of transubstantiation is still helpful. The next challenge lies in how to take this truth about the Real Presence of Christ and make it come alive in the hearts and lives of Christians through vibrant descriptions in creative preaching and catechesis.
