You Are Really Something!

he description of the disciples found in today's Gospel is an impressive compliment—and an even greater challenge. Jesus tells them they are "salt of the earth" (Matthew 5:13), bringing out the good taste of living. In other words, life would be bland and uninteresting without them. They are also the "light of the world" (Matthew 5:14), helping people find their way. Without them, others would stumble and fall. Jesus is telling them how important they are in the lives of others. They could each and all say: I am really something!


Such compliments are also a challenge. What must one do to be salt and light in the lives of others? The Isaian passage provides some suggestions: Share your bread with the hungry; shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked; don't turn your back on your own; remove from your midst oppression, false accusation, and malicious speech. In other words, to be salt or light is to meet the needs of the needy. This teaching of Jesus is not as easy as it might at first look.

Jesus is speaking to his disciples, his followers. They are not those who are simply curious about this itinerant preacher or remarkable healer. They have chosen to follow him, not merely from place to place, but to model their lives after his. Isn't that what we also claim to be—his followers? Haven't we promised to model our lives after his? If so, as both compliment and challenge he says to us as well, "You are really something!"

World Day of Prayer



If, for some reason, it does not match your previous training to this account and you are prompted to register for a class, please register for "PREVIOUSLY ATTENDED-DATE NOT LISTED" and send an email to the address below. We will apply the correct training record to your account.

Use may use the links in your approval checklist to access these requirements. These steps may be completed all at once or may be completed separately at your convenience. You will receive an automated email weekly to remind you which requirements are outstanding. When all compliance requirements have been completed, your account will be approved and you will be clear to work with minors and vulnerable adults.

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

All of the 7th and 8th graders in our school just completed their official Initiation into the Catholic Church by receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation last Sunday at 10 a.m. Mass. The first step was their Baptism, the 2nd First Communion, and now they are all the way in. Many of you joined in that celebration but many more went to one of our other Masses on that Feb. 2nd weekend, the Solemnity of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple.

I want to recall the powerful message of the priest administering Confirmation at 10 a.m. Mass, Fr. Michael Boehm, the Vicar for our Diocese who represents the Archbishop, and also the President of Francis Borgia High School. This Confirmation was unique---landing on Presentation day---and so Father Mike pointed out to the candidates one of the little-observed details in that Gospel. Simeon, an old Prophet who was serving in the temple, "took him (Jesus) in his arms," from the arms of Mary, (Lk 2:30-32) When Mary places Jesus in Simeon's arms, who represents the whole community, that means "she is placing Him in yours," said Father Mike. We are well past the sweet displays of Christmas time that we might look at like a show, apart from us. Presentation is the traditional end of Christmas time because now, a Baby in your arms looks up in your eyes and silently asks, "Am I safe with you?" Christmas is complete, like our Initiation into the Church through Confirmation, when we are grown-up enough in the Faith to receive that question of Christ, and answer for ourselves what we will do with His presence in our lives. The way we answer that is by our use of the gifts of the Holy Spirit..."for building up the body of Christ," (Eph 4:12) the Church. Our newly-Confirmed were learning about those gifts this year. To join with them, we have begun a process in our Parish called Stewardship renewal, and over the next three years we will explore what our gifts of the Holy Spirit are, how we are using them, and where we can improve on that. Let's make Confirmation more than something we watched, but a way that each of us has taken the gifts of Jesus in our own arms. Blessings!

Dear Padre,

My church spends too much on flower arrangements. Are they really needed?

Plowers and plants in homes and other buildings create a sense of beauty and welcome. They also help lift the spirits of the infirm in hospitals and the pall of sadness from those who mourn a loved one. Similarly, flowers in churches awaken our senses, embody hospitality, and enliven

our spirits. Moreover, living flowers and plants serve "as a reminder of the gift of life God has given to the human community" ("Built of Living Stones," 129, USCCB,

2000).

Along with other church adornments—both fixed and movable—flowers enkindle in the worshiper a feeling of what St. Peter said at the transfiguration, "Lord, it is good that we are here" (Matthew 17:4, Luke 9:33). They add dignity to the sacred space and visually express the holiness of the mysteries celebrated there. "Sacred buildings and requisites for divine worship should be truly worthy and beautiful and be signs and symbols of heavenly realities" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 288).

Nevertheless, "floral decoration should always show moderation and be arranged around the altar rather than on the altar table" (GIRM 305). Restraint in floral decoration is the norm during Advent. It's forbidden during Lent, except on Laetare Sunday and feasts, although simple compositions other than flowers are permissible.

To control costs, some parishes rely on volunteers with flower-arranging skills. Arrangements left behind at funerals and funeral homes and from church weddings are also offered for the benefit of the faithful.
