Human Rules and God's Rule

Today's painting is of the golden calf, produced by the Israelites when Moses disappeared up the mountain to receive God's law. Since Moses delayed, they melted gold brought from Egypt, made

their own god, and began worshiping it. This is the essence of idolatry: We create a god to worship, but since it is our creation, we are really worshiping ourselves.

Jesus accused the Pharisees of falling into a similar trap. They hid behind laws created in the name of religion to serve themselves and their desire for power. Jesus overturns the tables of their selfjustifications. He quotes the prophet as an accusation: "This people honors me with their lips, but

their hearts are far from me" (Mark 7:6).

Before pointing an accusatory finger, realize that the same can happen to us. We can cling to human traditions and laws while disregarding God's basic commands of love and mercy. We can hide

behind those laws and traditions to justify our self-righteousness and look down on others who are not as pious as

Washington Area Steering Committee Update

As you know, a Steering Committee made up of representatives from each of the parishes in and around the Washington area has been working diligently since February studying past and present educational realities in our schools and parishes and developing recommendations as to how we might continue to provide for the evangelization and formational needs of our parish families. The pastors are happy to report that in mid-July the Steering Committee completed its study and made the following recommendation:

The Washington Area Steering Committee recommends that a regional Catholic school system be created that would provide quality faith-based Catholic education in a financially responsible, affordable, and sustainable manner for the parishes and families in the Washington and Southern Warren County area.

In addition, the members of the Steering Committee listed a number of tenets that could be included in the formation of such a system. A copy of these tenets is attached for your consideration. Finally, the Steering Committee made a suggestion that the pastors take immediate action to carefully study this recommendation and to involve appropriate individuals or groups in determining what such a system might look like from the perspective of programs, staffing, finance and facilities.

The pastors are indeed grateful to every member of the Steering Committee for the time, energy and effort put forth in creating this exciting vision of how we, as Catholic communities, might more effectively meet the academic and religious formation needs of our children. Following the Steering Committee's suggestion for immediate action, the pastors met in late July after studying the recommendation and tenets carefully. At that time, they requested the Archdiocesan Office of Catholic Education and Formation provide more detailed information and options in regard to what a regional Catholic school system might look like. The pastors will begin to review the information from the Archdiocesan staff in August. In fall, the pastors will then update the Steering Committee on their progress and also meet with parishioners, parents and educators. The pastors will move towards finalizing a plan after reviewing the input from these groups. The next phase in the process will move toward timeline and implementation of that plan.

As this process moves forward, please keep in mind the following points:

- No decision has been made as yet and, in the meantime, the 2018-19 school year will proceed without any change.
- While this recommendation is primarily focused on our elementary schools, it will also have positive implications for the evangelization and faith formation needs of all within our parish communities.
- Parishioners, parents and educators will continue to receive communications regarding the development of a plan.
- Parishioners, parents and educators will be involved in making this plan a reality.

The pastors ask for your continued patience and prayers in the coming months as together we formulate a new vision for our elementary schools in the Washington area.

Washington Area Steering Committee Recommendation to the Pastors July 2018

Recommendation

The Washington Area Steering Committee recommends that a regional Catholic school system be created that would provide quality faith-based Catholic education in a financially responsible, affordable, and sustainable manner for the parishes and families in the Washington and Southern Warren County area. This regional Catholic school system should include the following tenets for programs, staffing, finance and facilities:

Program Tenets

- 1. A standardized curriculum and instructional program should be developed and utilized in all schools throughout the system.
- 2. One school calendar and schedule should be established for all schools within the system.

Staff Tenet

3. All administrators, teachers and support staff should become employees of the regional school system.

Finance Tenets

- 4. All school-related financials would be consolidated under the regional education system.
- 5. One tuition rate should be established for all schools within the system.
- 6. The cost of education would be identified, standardized on a per student basis, and distributed fairly and equitably to all parishes and students.
- 7. A measurement of reimbursement to parishes should be established and formalized for the use of space/classrooms.
- 8. Christian service or Stewardship requirement should be established for families to qualify for parish subsidy

Facilities Tenet

9. School facilities should be studied to determine if it is possible to create a middle school at one site.

Pastors letter to the People of St. Ignatius

Our Missionary from The Democratic Republic of the Congo. Fr Luhumbu, was very moved by the generosity and prayerful Spirit of our people last weekend. No surprise to this Pastor! Last weekend, in light of the crisis of the Church in Pennsylvania, I wrote to you of my resolve to follow the regulations (FBI-guided) for all Catholic institutions for the protection of youth and vulnerable adults. Archbishop Carlson is most committed to this, and that is why he invited Attorney General Hawley to come and inspect all records to verify our compliance with the regulations throughout the Archdiocese. It is fitting on Labor Day, as I honor all of you who labor in the Lord's service in the home and elsewhere, that all of us renew our commitment to labor for all people who are in the most vulnerable condition. In the workplace, it is generally the workers who are not the owners, who are in the more vulnerable power position on the job. That is why the Church, beginning in 1891, decided to stand on the side of workers who wished to form "associations" (the Church's term) for the purpose of standing up for their rights as human beings. You will hear this Pastor preaching repeatedly of God's resolve to lift up the most vulnerable, and so, of our obligation as Catholics to cooperate with that resolve. I enjoy going to the casino to gamble, but I have seen people gamble and lose all of their money. Is gambling considered a sin?

no play games of chance, to bet on horse or dog races, or to buy lottery L tickets are, in and of themselves, innocent undertakings that can be sources of fun—and even financial returns. But circumstances can change an innocent game into something morally suspect, even downright wrong. When

a person gets so involved with gambling that it becomes addictive, when the welfare of the gambler and the gambler's family is jeopardized, gambling ceases to be a harmless amusement. Instead, it becomes an irresponsible practice—indeed, objectively, a sin. The sin lies in the neglect of one's responsibilities to self, family, and God.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says this about gambling: "Games of chance or wagers are not in themselves contrary to justice. They become morally unacceptable

when they deprive someone of what is necessary to provide for their needs or those of others. The passion for gambling risks becoming an enslavement"

A survey of a local group of Gamblers Anonymous highlights the potential destructive nature of this activity. Within this group, the gambling addiction has led 22 percent to divorce, 40 percent to lose their jobs, 49 percent to steal money with which to pay their gambling debts, and 63 percent to contemplate suicide.
