

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

I hope you're ready to rejoice all year with the angels singing at Christmas time, today more than ever! Today, the Baptism of Jesus, is the official end of Christmas time in our life as a Church. It is time to put away our Christmas things at home and at Church, but not with minds blank and thoughtlessly, because we are 'tired of looking at them' and had them up long enough to feel like "we had Christmas." What sad notions. We the believers in Him put away the child in the manger and Mary and Joseph, because we sense His light within us is brightest now, so we do not need a manger scene to remind us. We put away the three Magi who represent the whole human race coming from afar to Him, because we have brought to Him our sins as gifts, like gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Some sins have been great and have kept us far from Him---some not so great---but we brought them all to Him at Christmas time. Sins are gifts in His eyes when we bring them truthfully and humbly. I emphasize this because of the meaning of the Feast of this weekend, the Baptism of Jesus. Even though He has no sin and no need of Baptism, He announces to the world by a baptismal action, before all the words He will during his life, why he has been born into the world. By humbly accepting Baptism when he has no sin, He is taking on all sin! Does any of this sound familiar? Yes His Baptism is connected with Good Friday. We get Baptized because of our need for salvation. He gets Baptized to get close to that need. We face death because our sins have brought it on us. He faces death to get close to our humanity, as close as a newborn Babe to his mother and father at the manger. So put away the Christmas things with intention, believing in the link between Christmas and Good Friday and Easter, rejoicing as much as the angels for how close He remains to us year round.



Dear Padre,

What does holy water do, and why is it near the entrance to the church?

Blessed water is a sacramental—a sign of spiritual effects and favors from God. The Church admonishes us to use sacramentals, like holy water, crucifixes, and rosaries, with reverence and respect.

Water is full of mystery. Although material, it can express something spiritual. It cleanses us from filth and impurities; therefore, water is a symbol



of interior cleansing and purifying. It also symbolizes life. The scarcity of water in many regions, including the Holy Land, gives it special value. What's more, water is necessary for the existence of all plants, animals, and people.

In Matthew's Gospel, John the Baptist baptized with water as an outward sign of inner sorrow for personal sins. In the sacrament of baptism instituted

by Christ, we are washed completely and born again of water and the Spirit. Water here symbolizes the grace of God washing away our sins, purifying our souls, and giving us new life in Christ.

The custom of placing a holy water font near the church doors is quite old. As you enter a Catholic church, making the sign of the cross with holy water reminds you of your baptism and of cleansing yourself before you approach God's presence. As you leave, bless yourself again and recall that baptism has marked you for eternal life. When we bless ourselves with holy water, we do it "in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."
