Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

I write this having just come from a beautiful Mass led by Bishop Rivituso for the Memorial of Saint Benedict. He emailed all the priests about his willingness to come out to parishes and lead a weekday as part of his support for the ongoing Nationwide Eucharistic Revival. We were one of the first parishes to invite him. I did so because I thought it was exciting when he told me his reason. He doesn't want that Revival to get lost amidst the busyness of parishes going through the pending changes. I love the way the bishop in his homily, wove together that important value with the wisdom of Benedict. His famous Latin slogan was "Ora et labora," pray and work. So, the Bishop's Benedictine wisdom for us this week was, don't get caught up only in the busyness, 'the work,' of how we will maintain buildings and programs that are long established, or the newer ministries we have started in recent years, and end up separating that vital work from the way we will pray and seek Eucharistic Revival. We do all our Parish works as an outgrowth of Eucharist. For Benedict, prayer and work are two sides of a coin. The bishop used another powerful phrase to describe this integration of work and prayer: "We live the Eucharist." Isn't it great that a Bishop visited us at the Lord's Altar-Table, not for some big event like Confirmation, but just to be with us and to keep the Eucharistic Revival in front of us as we face the changes that I am about to go through and the ones that you face? In the wisdom of Benedict, we don't just plan our way through these parish changes on August 1st and then work through them with our agendas. We pray, "we live the Eucharist," through the change.



Dear Padre,

I have a friend who has been coming to church with me, and he often has questions I can't answer. The big one last week was, "Why don't Catholics have more Bible preaching instead of all this ceremony?" I try to explain, but I don't think I have the right words. Help!

Your friend's question is very common because our Catholic ceremony can be confusing to those of other faiths.

The Catholic Mass comes from two prayer traditions. First, there is the tradition of the Jewish synagogue service where people gather to read and study the word of God. Second, there is

the tradition of the early Christians who met in their homes to celebrate the breaking of the bread.

The earliest Christians, Jewish converts, maintained their Sabbath tradition of reading and studying the word of God. They added to that the gift of the Eucharist that Jesus gave them. Our Mass puts these two together in the Liturgy of the Word (readings, preaching, prayers) and the Liturgy of the Eucharist (offering, eucharistic prayer, holy Communion).

The homily may not be as long as it is in some other Christian traditions, but the preaching should be solid, based on Scripture, and in line with the teaching of the Church. We are a Church of word and sacrament. We listen to the word of God and we celebrate the breaking of the bread.
