And like a credit card—but infinitely better—God is the love that fulfills our desires. And we never have to pay him back.

Pastor's letter to the People of St. Ignatius

During my time off last week, I heard from some friends and some former parishioners who are hurting because of the partial government shutdown in Washington. Sad to hear so many good people are suffering because of political leaders who cannot find a compromise. I was struck by the irony of hearing from these friends right on Dr. Martin Luther King Day, who would have certainly critiqued a government that would partially shut down and bring injustice to many vulnerable people. If you or anyone you know in our parish is hurting because of this, please let me know and our parish will certainly reach out to support them. The dysfunctional government also struck me for its contrast with our local situation in gathering our community to talk about our school in the last couple of weeks. Both the Town Hall on January 16th and the follow-up meeting on the 23rd were stellar examples, I thought, of a community airing strong and important feelings and values, in the presence of leaders in the Church, myself and our principal and steering committee reps, and the Diocese, working our way through to a holy resolution. As I write this I am still looking forward to hearing from a few more of our school families about their preference for our school next year, but I am certain that the Spirit is leading all of us in this process towards the best kind of school for our parish children. I will be meeting with the Parish Council about this on Monday evening and then announcing my decision soon. Thanks for all of your prayers for me and our school community!

What is the symbolic relationship between the altar and the Eucharist?

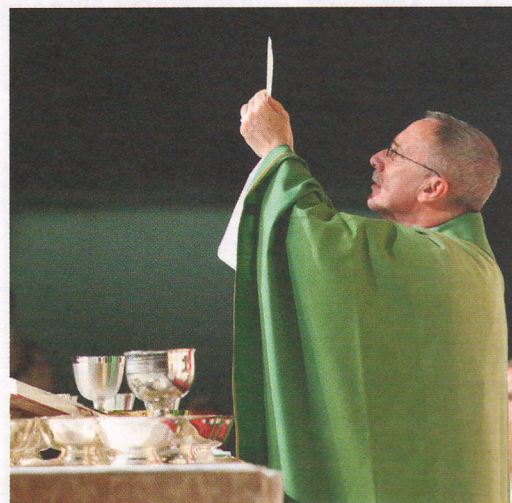
The altar, also called the table of the Lord, is not just a piece of furniture. Many generations ago, our earliest Christian ancestors gathered at dining-room tables for the Eucharist, and through the centuries that simple piece of furniture came alive with deep meanings.

It is from the altar that we share in the Eucharist, and the altar resonates with the presence of Christ. The altar is consecrated by a bishop and anointed with chrism, just as Christ was anointed priest, prophet, and king.

The gestures and rituals of the Catholic Church shape the expression of our faith and our hearts. We bow and genuflect to express reverence, honor, and devotion. These gestures are used not only by Roman Catholics and other Christians, but by people of other faiths, including Jews, Muslims, and Buddhists.

After the priest raises and shows the consecrated host and chalice to the assembly, he genuflects, and any concelebrants bow to the host and chalice. Norms exist for bowing to the altar and, at some points of the eucharistic celebration, kissing the altar. The kiss is an intimate act of showing reverence and honor.

The altar is a tangible sign of Christ and his sacrifice. We bow to the altar during the eucharistic liturgy and outside of the Mass as well, because for Catholics it's the central place of our encounter with Christ and with the great communion of saints.
