Appreciating God's Patience

G od is very patient, but his patience doesn't last forever.

In the Old Testament, after God spoke to Abraham and Lot's subsequent rebellion, some 500 years passed before God revealed himself again—this time to Moses. God takes the first step toward Abraham and, when his descendants turned away, he steps back. He reached out again to Moses and revealed his name so that Moses could enter into a personal relationship with

him and explain his name to others. God wants to be known by his people and by you!

So here we learn that with this revelation of God comes a responsibility. He unveils his mysterious face but he also desires a loving response and for us to witness about him to others.

Saint Paul makes it clear that God eventually ran out of patience with the Chosen People in the desert. After freeing the Israelites from Egypt with signs and wonders, giving them his law, and feeding them in the desert, they complained against him.

For Reflection


Is there a particular way I "desire evil things," as St. Paul says in the second reading?
God shows me patience and mercy yet again this year. How shall I respond?

Like the fig tree in the gospel, he gave them ample time and multiple encores of his love and mercy. Yet eventually, his love took the form of tough love—forty years of desert wanderings.

Lent is another expression of God's patience toward us. He is once again sowing the seeds of conversion, hoping for the fruits of our change of heart—fruits of love, forgiveness, repentance, and renewal.

He gives time for his cultivating efforts to take effect and for fruit to appear, but our life on earth is finite, so that time isn't unlimited.

Pastor's letter to the People of St. Ignatius

Lent is the time for improving all our human relations as well as those with God. One essential way that we deepen our connection with God is lifting up those whom the Lord and His Church are hearing, who are crying out for basic human needs and justice, especially when they are seemingly distant from our neighborhood. The next step on the Archbishop's initiative for deepening our unity with persons of color in our Diocese who are struggling for justice, is a listening session this Thursday at the Rigali Center in South St Louis at 7 p.m. by Danielle Brown, a member of the Bishops committee who helped our Archbishop and the Bishops in our country to write their letter on racial unity a few months ago, "Open Wide Our Hearts." She will be talking about how a parish can implement the vision of the Bishops' letter to us. I and some of the people of our Parish are already planning to go. Please contact me and I will help arrange carpools so more of us can go and bring these ideas back to our parish. Yes, we will continue to reach out to the poor inside our parish. But the distance from the struggling poor and especially people of color in concentrated areas of our own Diocese is the point that Jesus would emphasize. If you search the Scriptures, especially Luke, you will see Jesus pointing out the distance to someone as He stands between them and some group, personally bridging the gap between them. After we hear from the speaker this Thursday, some of us will read the Bishops' letter together, and we will talk about some concrete actions the Lord is calling us to take in order to bridge the gap in our Diocese. I have heard from Father Gettinger at Saint Augustine in St Louis that our parish is known for outreach into his community at Christmas time. We are going to bring that action back and more actions to lift up people who are struggling in our local St Louis Church. Let's pray this Lent about how to improve relationships where there was distance. This is the work of Jesus. Lenten joy to you!

Dear Padre,

Is the sprinkling rite at Mass necessary?

ccasionally on Sundays and Saturday evenings, especially in the Easter season and on feasts including Pentecost or the Baptism of the Lord, the blessing and sprinkling of water may take the place of the customary Penitential Act as a reminder of baptism. While the Penitential Act invites us to acknowledge our sins, the sprinkling rite not only reminds us of our failings but of our conversion through baptism.

Water is blessed before the sprinkling using these or similar words: "Grant, O Lord, in your mercy, that living waters may always spring up for our salvation, and so may we approach you with a pure heart and avoid all danger of body and soul" (The Roman *Missal*). If salt—a symbol of strength—is added to the water, it's first blessed in a



prayer to God "who commanded the prophet Elisha to cast salt into water, that impure water might be purified" (RM).

Also, the Church empties holy water fonts on the days of the Triduum to prepare for the blessing of water at the Easter Vigil, but removing holy water fonts during the season of Lent isn't permitted. To do so "is contrary to a balanced understanding of the season of Lent, which though truly being a season of penance, is also a season rich in the symbolism of water and baptism, constantly evoked in liturgical texts" (Congregation for Divine Worship). After all, every Sunday, even during Lent, is a little Easter!
